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Shimla, July, 2020

India Peaks at 63 Million Infections by 15th August, then the Trend Reverses

Khushi Sharma in her last article through mathematical modelling on excel sheets, had analyzed and forecasted that infections will peak in India by mid-August and 63 million people will be infected.

Many people commented and questioned this figure when currently (on 25th July 2020) the reported infections stand at 1.4 million. Here's my explanation based on evidence that reinforces the correctness of my model.

Delhi Trends

Surveillance studies with antigen testing were conducted in Delhi between 26th June to 5th July. Its findings revealed that 23.4% of Delhi's population is infected. The population of Delhi is about 20 millions. Those who get infected acquire antibodies in 7-15 days. This antigen testing checks the presence of these antibodies. If we have tested between 26th June to 5th July, the result reveals the spread of infection around 20th June. Therefore, we can say on 20th June, 23.4% of Delhi's population, that is 4.5 million people were infected.

Now let's have a look at the reported number of cases and deaths as on 20th June. The detected cases were then about 56,000 and reported deaths were 2112. Implying hardly 1.3% detection rate. https://blogwithkhushi.files.wordpress.com/2020/07/ daily-trend-of-covid-19-in-new-delhi.xlsx


Further Infection Fatality rate (IFR), which is the ratio of the number of deaths to the total infections, comes to be 0.05%. However, based on the epidemiological studies, IFR for India is in the range of 0.10-0.20%. Going by this and considering that there is a lag of 15 days between

infections and the death, the number of deaths due to corona virus in Delhi on 5th July should have been approximately 6,000. However, the reported deaths as on 5th July are 3067. As such the possibility of underreporting of deaths attributed to COVID-19, cannot be ruled out.

As deaths detections have similar trend with 2 weeks lag, we can use IFR to estimate number of infections based on the mortalities. IFR remains almost constant for a given population, provided that the deaths have been counted precisely.

The 25th July official data says 3,800 deaths and 129,531 reported cases. Plotting the daily detected cases reveals that the peak of the epidemic cycle (first cycle) happened around 24th June, implying the rate

In contrast Yog has 6 deep run oiled thread in nostril, out of internal body cleansing Kriyas - they are collectively known as the 6 Shatkarm Krivas of Hath Yog.

Patanjali's Yog Sutras are 195 in number and the word Asana is mentioned just once! So much for Nauli rotate belly Asanas being depicted as what Yog muscle: left, rigi actually is. Pick up any Yog magazine, visit any Yog studio and you will notice the focus is entirely on Asanas with scant mention of any basic detoxing kriyas.

The purport of this article is to

highlight the importance of the Yog Shatkarm Kriyas - especially in the current times of Covid, which is essentially attacking the human respiratory system.

Dhauti is one of the six Shatkarmas, purifications used in traditional hatha yoga; Vastra Dhauti, using a long cloth to clean the oesophagus and stomach, is illustrated here (source, Wikipedia)

The 6 Shatkarm Kriyas are (in alphabetical order)

- 1. Basti
- 2. Dhauti
- 3. Nauli
- 4. Neti
- 5. Kapaal Bhaati Pranayam
- 6. Traatak Kriya

Basti

Basti is Sanskrit for bladder. In

New Education Policy To Be A Milestone: Pokhriyal

New Delhi, Jul (UNI) — Hailing the New Education policy approved by the Union Cabinet, Union Minister for Human Resource and Development Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank' said that the new education policy will prove to be a milestone in creation of a new India. "For the first time in the history of the country, to formulate a policy at such a wide scale, discussions have been held with teachers from parents and village committees, public representatives from every corner of the country and after that a new education policy has been prepared," the Minister said at a press conference.

The Union Cabinet, approved the much-awaited new education policy and the Ministry of Human

Resource Development has been renamed as Ministry of Education in the new policy. The country has again got a new education policy after 34 years.

The much-awaited New Education Policy 2020 envisages major reforms in higher education, including target of 50 per cent gross enrolment ratio by 2035 and provision for multiple entry/exit. Addressing a briefing on the Cabinet decision, Higher Education Secretary Amit Khare said the NEP would promote multi-disciplinary education and integrated five year Bachelor's/Master's course.


Other features include graded academic, administrative and financial autonomy of institutions and single regulator for all higher education working under a self-disclosure based transparent system for approvals in place of numerous 'inspections'.

Also, e-courses will be developed in regional languages, virtual labs developed and a National Educational Technology Forum (NETF) is being created, he said.

Built on the foundational pillars of Access, Equity, Quality, Affordability and Accountability, this policy is aligned to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and aims to transform India into a vibrant knowledge society and global knowledge superpower by making both school and college education more flexible, multidisciplinary, suited to 21st century needs and aimed at bringing out the unique capabilities of each student.

of spread of infection would have slowed down thence on. Taking cue from other countries, roughly 40% of infections happens before peak, and 60% after peak till the end of first cycle.


An epidemic cycle is said to end when the daily infection reporting becomes 1/10th of the peak time infection reporting. With about 2,365 deaths reported at the peak time (24th June), sometime in end of August, the first epidemic cycle would end and, Delhi would expect 6,000 deaths reported and almost 60% of its population (12 million) would be infected due to COVID-19. Actual death count till then would be approximately 12,000. However, almost more than half of the deaths would remain unreported.

Indian Scenario

As we have seen that Covid 19 has remained mainly an urban centric epidemic. Total urban population of India is approximately 400 million. Compared to our metro cities, the other urban centres are less densely populated as such it is expected that at the peak 15-20% of the total urban population will get infected and by the end of the first epidemic cycle, 45-50% of the total urban population will get infected. In

numbers, approximately 60-80 million population will be infected at the peak.

The current statistics tell that as on 25th July 1.4 million people have been infected and 32,000 have died because of Covid. Taking cue from the Delhi analysis, if in Delhi only 50% of the deaths have been reported, it can be safely assumed that the upper bound on death reporting in India is 66%. As such we can assume that by now 50,000 deaths have already happened. Also there is a lag of 14 days between infections and death. Considering an IFR of 0.15%,



i.e., 1.5 deaths per 1,000 infections, two weeks back, i.e., on 11th July, the total infection count in India was around 33 million. These are conservative estimates and lower bound of our projections. At present for India, the doubling time (the time to double up the infections in a given population) is about 24 days which is expected to increase to 30-35 days as we near the peak. As such between 11th to 15th August when we peak, the actual infections will be around 60-65 million. This is in line with my projections in my earlier blog. By mid-August the number of infections across

the country would double up, with peak reaching at 63 million infections as I had illustrated through my mathematical modelling.

In the ideal COVID universe, 10-15% of the infections get detected but we have seen the detection rate comes to about 1.5% for the capital city, Delhi. However, what matters most is the number of critical patients and

mortalities. Our major concern is to reduce need for hospitalisations and subsequent deaths. Therefore, there is a need to have the right monitoring metrics to incentivise early detection and early treatment. With right monitoring metrics forecast of our model can become more accurate and we can better intervene to check the mortalities.

नई दिल्ली 15 जुलाई -- केंद्रीय माध्यमिक शिक्षा बोर्ड (सीबीएसई) की दसवीं बोर्ड की परीक्षा में एक बार फिर लड़िकयों ने बाजी मार ली है और किन्नरों का परिणाम 78.95 प्रतिशत रहा। बारहवीं की परीक्षा में भी लड़िकयों ने बाजी मारी थी। बारहवीं के बोर्ड की तरह दसवीं बोर्ड में भी तिरुवनंतपुरम क्षेत्र देश में सबसे टॉप पर रहा। सीबीएसई द्वारा बुधवार को जारी विज्ञित्त के अनुसार इस वर्ष 5,377 परीक्षा केंद्रों पर 20,387 स्कूलों में एक करोड़ 87 लाख 315 छात्रों ने परीक्षा दी जिसमें

91.46 प्रतिशत छात्र पास हुए और पिछले साल की तुलना में इस वर्ष 0.36 प्रतिशत अधिक रिजल्ट हुआ।

ancient times, yogis would fill up the lower colon using the bladder of a dead animal in order to cleanse the lower descending colon. However, in modern times due to the development of hydro colonic cleansing

systems (which are easily doable in any modern Spa) this Shat Karm kriya is rather not needed.

Dhauti

There are several kriyas under Dhauti but the most effective and the most detoxifying kriya is Varisar Dhauti - more popularly known as Laghu Shankh Prakshalan Kriya. Vari means water and Sar means essence.

Under Laghu Shankh Prakshalan Kriya, a practitioner typically ingests eight glasses of saline lukewarm water. The ratio of rock salt (more commonly known as Sendha Namak in India) is 1 tsp salt in 1 litre of water. This is to mimic the isotonic salt content in human blood of 0.9%.

The Kriya is done on an empty stomach in the morning on a rain free and cold free day. Try to eat a light dinner the night before - preferably a fruitarian diet or something light like a Khichdi.

Two glasses of the lukewarm saline water are drunk seated in Kaag Asan or Mal Asan and then a set of five rather easy to do Yogic Asanas are done in order. These are Tad Asana, Tiryak Tad Asana, Kati Chakra Asana, Tiryak Bhujang Asana and Uddharva Akarshan Asana.

Typically after consuming the 5th/6th glass, bowel motion begins. Depending upon each individual's colonic state of accumulated toxins,

the number of bowel movements will happen. The Kriya is followed up with Jal Neti and Kunjal Kriya and then lying in Shashank Asan and Shav Asana. A light diet regimen of excess ghee laden khichdi has to be followed throughout the entire day. The body falls into sleep mode and once experiences lightness - especially in the mind.

Neti

Neti is Sanskrit for nose. Please do not confuse it with Neeti - which is statecraft like Raineeti.

This is a rather easy to do Shatkarm Kriya which can be self learnt too by watching YouTube videos. Again the ratio of salt in water is similar to Laghu Shankh Prakshalan.

Please ensure you blow out any excess water by doing forceful exhalation of water as in Kapaal Bhaati Pranayam. Himachal being a cold state, if the excess water is not blown out it could lead to severe cold congestion.

The exercise is claimed to serve the cleaning of the abdominal region - digestive organs, small intestine - and is based on a massage of the internal belly organs by a circular movement of the abdominal muscles. You may have seen Baba Ramdev do it on TV.

Kapaal Bhaati Pranayam

Interestingly it is not considered as Pranayam but as one of the 6 Shatkarm Kriyas to exhale out excess carbon dioxide from our bodies - again a process of cleaning up built up toxic CO2 gas from our bodies.

Traataka

Trataka is a yogic purification and a tantric method of meditation that involves staring at a single point such as a small object, black dot or candle flame. It is said to bring energy to the "third eye" and promote various psychic abilities.

Kaya Kalp in Palampur in Himachal has an excellent OPD training centre and you could also find a trained Yog teacher locally. Along with the above Kriyas, I would highly recommend consumption of Shankh Pushpi (with Bhrami) tonic sold by Baidyanath. It is a sweet tonic and vastly improves memory functions. Once you begin practice you will notice a huge improvement in your memory, sleep and other cognition functions which are much needed as a student.

Revised Syllabi by CBSE for Classes IX-XII for 2020-21

Considering the importance of learning achievement, it has been decided to rationalize syllabus up to 30% by retaining the core concepts - HRD Minister

Keekli Bureau, July, Delhi -- Union Minister for HRD Ramesh Pokhrival 'Nishank' has said that looking at the extraordinary situation prevailing in the country and the world, CBSE was advised to revise the curriculum and reduce course load for the students of Class 9th to 12th. Accordingly, CBSE has revised the syllabi for classes IX-XII for the academic session 2020-21 He also informed that a few weeks ago, he invited suggestions from all educationists on the reduction of syllabus on social media by using #SyllabusForStudents2020. Shri Nishank informed that we received more than 1.5 K suggestions and expressed his gratitude to everyone for the

overwhelming response.

The Minister said that the changes made in the syllabi have been finalised by the respective Course Committees with the approval of the Curriculum Committee and Governing Body of the Board. The revision of syllabi is a measure taken due to the extraordinary situation prevailing in the country and at different parts of the world.

Considering the importance of achieving the level of learning, the syllabus has been rationalised to the extent possible up to 30% by retaining the core concepts. The Heads of Schools and Teachers have been advised by the Board to ensure that the topics that have

been reduced are also explained to the students to the extent required to connect different topics.

However the reduced syllabus will not be part of the topics for Internal Assessment and year-end Board Examination. Alternative Academic Calendar and inputs from the NCERT on transacting the curriculum using different strategies shall also be part of the teaching pedagogy in the affiliated schools. For Elementary Classes (I-VIII) schools shall follow the Alternative Academic Calendar and Learning Outcomes specified by NCERT. Keekli Bureau, July, Shimla -- Emphasizing on skilling and re-skilling, Governor Bandaru Dattatraya said that Jan Shikshan Sansthan should be set in every district of the State and youths should be given more attention towards improvement of their Skills along with qualitative training so that they get better employment opportunities and Himachal Pradesh Skill Development Corporation could play an important role in carrying out this objective. He was speaking on the occasion of World Youth Skill Day in a Webinar, organized by Himachal Pradesh Skill Development Corporation at Raj Bhavan, Shimla.

He said that skill and technology were important in the changing perspective and knowledge of both could provide stability to any youth in the direction of employment and self-employment. "Opportunities for employment were less by working on traditional style. Skill will have to be increased by changing the basic ideas. We should change the labour-based system to a skill-based system", said Dattatraya.

The Governor said that India was a young nation, whose population in the age group of 15 to 35 years was continuously increasing and this population would reach about 65 percent by the year 2036, while it was decreasing in other countries. He said that demographic dividend would be fully realized only when India was able to provide universal quality education to its young population. He also stressed on promoting entrepreneurship and said that through skill, youth should start their own business so that they can also provide employment to others.

Emphasizing on Skilling and Re-skilling: Dattatraya

Governor asked all the line departments providing skill training to work in coordination. By taking advantage of the Gareeb Kalyan Rojgar Abhiyan, workers could be provided employment opportunities at the village level, he added. He emphasized on reducing the gap between skills and employment. He expressed satisfaction on the standard of ITIs established in the state and said that they were doing better in skill development. He advocated skill education at school level and said that this education could be imparted at two levels in 9th and 12th standard and two other phases should be done at ground level. He also expressed happiness that under Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojna-2, so far 16 thousand youths of the state have been registered in 22 different areas for training and, more than 9000 youth have been

Bikram Singh, Industry, Technical Education, Vocational and Industrial Training Minister said that State Government was making all efforts for skill development of youth and better results could be seen. He said that the Government has started a skill register portal to provide employment in the state to the youth coming from outside the States due to corona pandemic. So far, more than 14 thousand youth besides 74 employers have registered on this portal.

He said that under the Himachal Pradesh Skill Development Project funded by Asian Development Bank, a Centre of Excellence was being set up at an estimated cost of Rs. 68 crore at Kandaghat in Solan district. Under this, the youth would be given quality



training in the fields of hospitality, tourism and information technology, he added.

Earlier, Lalit Jain, Managing Director, HP Kaushal Vikas Nigam welcomed and thanked the Governor on the occasion. He briefed about the various activities of the Nigam and the initiatives being taken to impart skill to the students in various fields.

The Governor also interacted with the students of KVN from Sirmour, Solan, Kangra and Hamirpur and they have also shared their experiences with the Governor. Live Skill Demonstration on tourism and hospitality and health care was given by trainee students of Skill Development Centre, Sunder Nagar. A short film on skill development activities was also shown on the occasion.
